FLEE TO EGYPT. The Gospel of Matthew highlights the many difficulties faced by Mary and Joseph before and after the birth of Jesus. But Matthew highlights also the abiding presence of God, who is with them on every step of their journey. We see in these early episodes what Jesus will make explicit at the end of the Gospel: 'And know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time.'

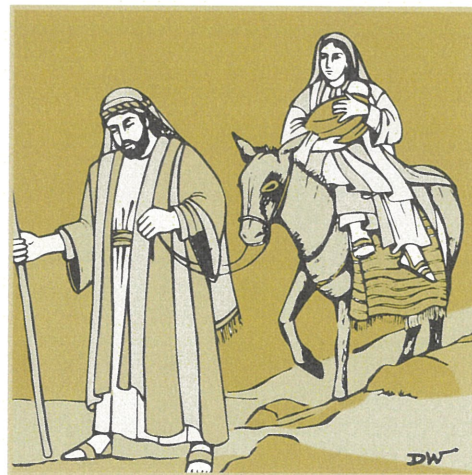

There he settled in a town called Nazareth. In this way the words spoken through the prophets were to be fulfilled:

He will be called a Nazarene.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

LIVING OUT ISRAEL'S HISTORY

With today's feast we return to one of Matthew's special heroes, Joseph. As we have already seen, Matthew's Joseph is like the Old Testament patriarchal figure—he is a 'dreamer' who leads God's family. In this Gospel Joseph has a dream, a privileged religious experience of divine communication. In this dream, an angel, the Gospel's representation of the presence of God, appears and again directs Joseph. This time it is to escape into Egypt; Herod is out to execute the child Jesus. Like ancient Israel through the Old Testament story of the other Joseph who goes to Egypt, Matthew's Joseph leads Mary and the child into Egypt and safety, paralleling the story of Israel.

For Matthew, Jesus is the symbolic representation of Israel's story and sums up in his being the desire of God to free the people from disaster. After Herod dies, Joseph—perhaps now an insomniac!—gets another dream to go back to Israel. Instead of returning to his hometown, which in Matthew is Bethlehem, he takes the family 'into exile' to Nazareth because of the murderous intent of Herod's son, Archelaus. In this last movement, Jesus completes the cycle of Israel's story—being called, to Egypt, to the exodus and finally, into exile. It is from this perspective that the rest of Matthew's Gospel unfolds. The evangelist, writing to Jewish followers of Jesus, is keen to show how Jesus is a true Israelite, living out Israel's history.

Two things might be reflectively helpful for the contemporary family; God always accompanies the family of Jesus in its journey, no matter where it leads; trust one's dream. God can communicate in different and, sometimes, unpredictable ways.

Words from the desk of the PP:

More words—it seems as though I just finished the Christmas words—oh, of course, I did, now, I am casting my mind, my thoughts, my heart to the future—the time after Jesus' birth.

As with Christmas Day, I don't have a lot of parish news—the doings of the year have wound down and will pick up again in late January or in February. Parish life is slowing. Perhaps time for a few breaths. Maybe a few moments for reflection will be given.

A couple of thoughts / reflections:

Untitled Poem 2, by Joyce Balnaves (yes, my mother).

There sprung from day to night
A lightling star which, shining bright
Drew from some shepherds gasps of fear
For something unknown called them near
A stable, poor but warm with love—
A babe lit by that star above.
What grace was this that made them kneel
In wonder at the power to feel
This moment fixed for all of time
No matter where or what the clime?
Now is the hour for joy to reign
For hope can conquer all our pain.
New life to come and others spared
Are part of fifty years we shared.
We're blessed because we have each other,
Kith and kin, sister and brother.
And therefore let the bells bright mirth
Proclaim to all our saviour's birth.

Every so often I go back to a slim blue volume of poems penned by my mother. In part, to remember her. In part to seek, and often find, inspiration. As is the wont of poets she was able to create a image beautifully and sometimes found words, such as 'lightling' that don't exist except that they do exist for this particular scansion that is needed, and works. And to weave personal live into the story of salvation (50 years shared is my parents lives together, to choose just one weaving).

I read this poem and marvel at the way my mother had the reality of the birth of Christ and the truth of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph intertwined into the fabric of her existence. And I am reminded of how much this influenced my growing up and my life ever since.

It is this 'making personal' of our life with Christ that will lead us to deeper and deeper intimacy with God. St John of the Cross says that only love can make the soul pleasing to God:

My soul is occupied,
And all my substance is at his service;
Now I guard no flock,
Nor have I any other employment:
My sole occupation is love.

Each of us is called to embark upon the journey my mother speaks of in poetry. Each of us is called to seek that our sole occupation is love. This is a journey for each of us. Similar to everyone else in that we follow Christ so that we can enter into the Father's love. But at the same time utterly unique because your journey is ... YOUR journey, and mine is mine.

Let us join the shepherd in praise and join Mary in pondering in our hearts.

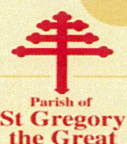
Sacramental Preparation Classes
