NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME / C

10 August 2025

KEEP AWAKE TILL HE COMES. The early Christians applied this teaching of Jesus to their expectation of his second coming. More generally speaking, today's Gospel parables should encourage us to be morally vigilant at all times and ever ready to encounter, in the midst of daily life, the 'God of surprises'. Paul has similar advice for us: 'Keep alert, stand firm in your faith' (1 Cor 16:13).


A reading from the book of Wisdom Just as you struck our enemies, you made us glorious by calling us to you.

#### **BREAKING OPEN THE WORD**

#### BE ALERT

Luke's audience consists of people who are wealthy and those who are poorer, from the lower rung of the social ladder. The evangelist's focus is frequently on those of comfortable and wealthy status. This is presumed in today's reading. This Gospel passage follows immediately from last Sunday's. Luke continues to reflect on the themes of wealth and the disciple's attentiveness to God. Jesus reminds Luke's audience that God wants to offer the Kingdom to all. It is not restrictive. But there is one barrier for its reception: wealth and greed—a theme noted last Sunday. Disciples are encouraged to be generous and respond tangibly to the needs of the poor, encouragement that is at the heart of Catholic social teaching.

A second theme emerges: besides generosity, disciples must also remember Jesus' *Parousia*, his coming at the end of time. This perspective is not to be forgotten, though perhaps some in the Lukan household had done so. The example are householders being alert to the master's eventual arrival after a wedding or to a burglar who might smash through the house's mud brick walls. Alertness is thus key. It will surface again later in the Gospel when the disciples are told in Gethsemane to 'keep awake!' Luke promises that such existential alertness will be substantially rewarded.

For ourselves, too, today's Gospel is a spiritually healthy reminder. As we gather around the Lord's Table, we are encouraged to an alertness for the Lord's coming at the end of time. The acclamation after the words of Institution in the Eucharistic Prayer echoes this.

Our latest experience started last Wednesday with 21 participants. Please keep the leaders and caterers in your prayers as we seek to open hearts to God's love.

#### Safeguarding:

David, Mary, Mary, Peter and I sat down last Wednesday to do a Risk Assessment for our Masses at St Greg's, especially weekend Masses. We will use the same process at St Kevin's and the issues will be almost identical because the gatherings are nearly identical in purpose. By the time we finished the hour and a half brainstorming we had listed over forty different elements to consider. The list covered much more than the ChildSafe elements. Some items were of great importance like how to respond effectively to a significant fall or implementing good processes around our Altar Servers as they vest. Some were seemingly trivial such as proper use of the air-conditioners. Our purpose in starting this detailed risk-assessment is to understand what we think we know and improve the safety of our gatherings for all of you, as well as be ready for the Safeguarding audit that is beginning across the archdiocese. Occupational Health and Safety efforts over the decades have shown the worth of moving from assuming we know what we are doing to consciously.

### Columbarium (a wall with niches for funeral urns to be interred):

Plans for a columbarium are well underway and have been submitted to council for approval. We are looking for more expressions of interest so that we can be reasonably certain that we are meeting your real need in the parish. Please call or email the office and express you interest. Once we have final plans in place, we will be contacting you to ask you to commit firmly and pay for the slots you want.

I see the columbarium as providing a new expression of our faith, allowing us to accompany our faithful departed in a sensible and respectful way that keeps them within our parish community in a gentle and loving way.

#### Insurance:

We are seeing a shift in our insurances. There is a greater level of detail being demanded of us in specifying what we want insured and the exact value of it that we see. The aim is to allow access to the most relevant and cheapest insurance. I mention this because it seems to me to be a part of a shift in society. Risk is not borne by me to help you: rather I leave you to bear your own risks. It seems to me to run counter to what Christ teaches us about love for one another with God's self -giving, care for the other that nourishes our souls. Food for though as we navigate a more and more nuanced complexity in society.


