THE END IS NOT SO SOON. Members of the early Church expected the Lord to return in glory very soon. Some people even stopped working in the belief that the end was nigh. St Paul, however, urged the members of the community to go on working, quietly earning their food. And in today's Gospel, Jesus stresses that the end is not so soon. We, his followers, will first have to persevere faithfully through many trials.

Then he said to them, 'Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. 'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name - and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.'

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

GOD'S PROTECTIVE PROMISE

Last Sunday we commemorated the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica. The Gospel then was from John with Jesus cleansing the Temple and its precincts, restoring it as the rightful abode of God's presence and holiness. Today's Gospel, continuing our liturgical journey with Luke, touches again on the theme of the Temple. But this time, Jesus anticipates its destruction and then springboards Gospel listeners into a sermon on the endtime. The Gospel theme prepares us for the final Sundays of the year before the new liturgical year, Year A and Matthew's Gospel, commences in two weeks' time with the beginning of Advent.

Today's Gospel is complex and often misunderstood. It requires careful explanation. Our selection comes from Luke's 'apocalyptic' chapter. Here the evangelist draws on Mk 13 but reshapes it in the light of the audience's experience and memory of Jerusalem's destruction by Rome in 70 CE. This experience is retrojected on to Jesus' teaching seeming to prophesy its destruction. In Jesus' day the Temple was still standing; by the time Luke writes, Jerusalem and its Temple are already destroyed.

Luke's apocalyptic teaching acknowledges the struggle of Jesus' faithful followers living generations after Jesus public ministry, assuring them of God's comforting presence, warning them not to be carried away by messianic pretenders, and encouraging their patient endurance in all that unfolds. The last words of the Gospel contain the essence of God's protective promise: '...not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.' We, too, lean into these words amid our struggles today.

Words from the desk of the PP:

33rd Sunday: The last Sunday before the Feast of Christ the King – ordinary time is drawing to a close. Our journey in life towards the end of times is drawing to a close – our journey to reflect upon our own faith and how we live it draws to a conclusion: so take a little time this weekend and in the coming week to reflect on who Jesus Christ is for you in your daily life.

<u>ACYF!!! Australian Catholic Youth Festival:</u> preparations well underway – keep all pilgrims to ACYF in your prayers.

Fr Charles' Retreat: I go on retreat for 5 ½ days each November. For the last quite some years I have been going to clergy retreats at Santa Casa in Queenscliff. I come partly because it is organised for clergy – start after Masses on Sunday, finish on Friday in time to get back and prepare for the weekend; and partly because it is useful and instructive to sit with other parish priests / retired priests and hear their stories of how they have resolved issues in parish life. Mostly I choose to come because I need the time to relax into my relationship with Our Lord – Christ Jesus our Messiah.

This year we have had Fr Chris Monaghan as our retreat director and he has taken us on a journey through the Year of Hope; Pope Francis and priests and priesthood; a bit on the Gospel of Matthew; fun with Leunig and his cartoons; pictures and reflections from his own work and photos from his drone; prayer in the Gospel of Luke and in Acts of the Apostles; the Gospel as a challenge that calls us into crisis, a crisis of change from what WE want to what the Gospel calls us to: to change in the core of our beings – not just with the moment of baptism, confirmation, marriage, holy orders (whichever are relevant) but throughout life. Baptism and Holy Orders particularly are said to "change" who we are deep down in the essence of our personhood. But this change is not a one off but the start of a life of change, a life leading further and further into the love that is Christ Jesus our Lord.

It took me till day four to be relaxed and properly present. I allowed a distraction on Thursday afternoon to type these words but otherwise Thursday is for Christ. I am managing to MAKE that happen.

Thursday: 6:30 am, walking on the beach, beautiful weather – still, air 7 deg C, clear skies, beautiful sun, waves breaking, friendly dogs on the beach, slow walking soaking in the beauty of creation: and God's love touched me – calming my mind and heart to just 'be present' – what a great gift. Too often I am in a rush and don't make the time – today the rush is gone and ... God is walking with me. Hallelujah! Indeed Hallelujah!

Another day to go yet so I pray that I shall return to you with even greater openness to you and the graces you bring to the parishes with which I am entrusted as your shepherd.

Repair of Leaks: Leaks – I said they were fixed. Misunderstanding. Rain got in the way (again). This coming week? We hope and pray.

<u>Columbarium</u>: We are well along the way of understanding what we want to do in having a columbarium. We asked for expressions of interest, and received 19 with interest for 40 niches, which suggests support for the possibility. We are nearing having council approval. The drawings are up on the gathering space. But there are two things left to do.

First, we must apply to the Archdiocese for approval as the expenditure will by well over \$100,000 (recouped from sale of the niches).

Second, we know that we haven't made space for a wide ranging discussion. I am happy to chat after Mass. There will be some discussion at the Parish Assembly this coming week. And, we will make some opportunities for more extensive discussion over coming weeks.

I would like to see the Columbarium built but I am not in a hurry. I, and the PPC and finance group want to make sure we hear fully what suits everyone.
