BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

HOPEFUL EXPECTATION

'What is the good of praying if wars and evil things continue to exist? Prayer seems to have no effect.' A similar concern existed in Luke's day: why pray if it seems ineffectual? Today's Gospel speaks to the heart of this. It takes the form of a parable, encouraging constant prayer. The parable concerns an unjust judge ignoring a troubling and annoying widow who seeks justice against an adversary—even though one translation inaccurately describes her antagonist as an 'enemy'. The widow needs help, and the judge refuses her request. That is, until she continues to badger him; finally, he relinquishes.

Luke's Jesus uses the story as a classical way of describing God: if the judge finally relents through persistent pleading how much more quickly will God respond to those who cry out for help. Prayer opens the one praying to God's presence, allowing God to act within the one praying for what is needed. This deeply religious perspective affects the pray-er in daily life. This in turn shapes wider social contact, which effects relationships and, eventually, global change. Local personal prayer has, though imperceptibly, universal influence.

The last sentence of the Gospel speaks into this global perspective: 'When the Son of Man comes will he find faith on earth?' In other words, in the eschaton, at the definitive coming of Christ at the end of time, will people have given up conviction that prayer is effective and that God responds to the cry of the needy? Today's Gospel encourages us to pray, constantly and with hopeful expectation.

Things we do: development in faith: Every year we prepare parents and children to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, or Reconciliation, or Holy Communion, or Confirmation. As we undertake these important moments of faith formation for our children I am struck each year by the delicate? difficult? balance there is between 'age appropriate' language and speaking of the deep truths and action of God that are the essence of each of the Sacraments: the visible sign is easy, the invisible work of Grace/God/Jesus/Holy Spirit in us is harder to convey.

It is easy to gloss over the real change that happens in Baptism – the deep reality of a change in our very being that aligns with and makes us fully a part of the Body of Christ Jesus our Lord. It is easier to speak of becoming part of the people and community of Jesus Christ.

We can speak of 'making bad choices,' because that is what children understand while Sin involves understanding something of our relationship with God.

We can speak of "a symbol of Jesus' presence" ... instead of the Real Presence and the real change in the essence of the Bread and Wine to, be transubstantiated, to become what truly and fully IS, the wholeness of our Lord, being given to us.

We can speak of Confirmation as "growing up in faith" and because it is difficult to speak to the real change in us that Confirmation brings because we have received his Gifts – difficult to speak of because we can find it difficult to admit the times the Holy Spirit guides us.

I understand the need for this care in language with children – confusion is not good, best to begin gently. But, please, let us not forget the deeper truth and let us consciously and actively find ways to help ourselves and our children grow to know the deeper truths and realities of our Sacraments so that their faith and ours can grow and flourish and alive and relevant.

Repair of Leaks: It has taken four years but we now have definitive diagnosis or the cause/source of the two remaining leaks in the church. Works to repair these leaks will be carried out from 27th to 31st October. Daily Masses will still occur, but there will be no other services. This will ensure that the workers have unimpeded access to the building.

All Saints Day - Saturday, November 1


