

Having been justified by his blood, we will be saved from God's anger through him.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

OUR BELOVED DEAD

Today we remember our Beloved Dead. We also carry them into today's liturgy, just as the widow's son in today's Gospel is carried into the presence of Jesus. The story begins with Jesus gathering near the gate of Nain with his disciples and others. This happens at the same time as a 'the only son of his mother' is being carried out on a bier for burial. We note two things about the situation: The deceased is an only son and she is widowed. These two facts elevate the story's tragedy. The woman is domestically and economically abandoned; her tears palpable. At the gate of the town, life and death meet.

Jesus, the agent of healing and life, responds to her: 'When the Lord saw her he felt sorry for her.' Jesus' seeing impels him to act. In an earlier Lukan parable (Lk 10), a Samaritan 'sees' a halfdead robbery victim. Unlike the other characters in the parable who pass by and look sideways, the Samaritan is impelled to act. In today's Gospel, Jesus responds similarly.

The title 'Lord' suggests that this is the act of God's emissary. The translation, 'felt sorry', robs the power of the Greek which literally means, 'felt his innards respond'. This visceral response brings Jesus to restore the young man to life, an act acclaimed as God's 'visitation' of the people. Like the woman, we carry our dead before Jesus today. He responds deeply to our sadness. Through him God also 'visits' us.

Words from the desk of the PP:

November: All Souls: Please put in your requests for November Masses for the souls of those you with to pray for during November when we make a special effort to pray for those who have gone before us. Yellow coloured envelopes for November Masses are in the Gathering Space with a box to place them in.

October Rosary: Thank you to the 20+ people each week (about 40 over the five Thursday) who joined this real and virtual prayer. Is there an on-going prayer ministry that might form around this? Any thoughts? Please pass them to me.

ACYF!!! Australian Catholic Youth Festival. 30th Nov – 2nd Dec. acyf.org.au – We have registered 23 people – registrations are closed. We now enter a phase of making sure we have all the logistics and planning in place to keep everyone safe and having a Spirit-Filled time.

Things we do:

Sanctuary Layout: Why is the Priest to the left of the Altar and the Lectern (Ambo) to the right of the Altar (as you face the nave, the congregation)? And why the Altar / Tabernacle / Crucifix in line?

Christ, the WORD of God is given primacy of place on the right of the Altar. The Presider is given importance but is separated from the lectern and the Altar to emphasise that he is not Christ, but presides for Christ, in the person of Christ. There is a small crucifix kept on the Altar itself to emphasise for Presider and People the one-ness of the sacrifice on the Altar and on the Cross. This layout is not mandatory, but customary – other layouts must continue to maintain the primacy of Christ and not the presider.

With the altar / tabernacle / crucifix: alignment along one axis: again, this is not a mandatory, but reflects a traditional and very common layout that visibly emphasises the inextricable unity/link between Christ offering of himself at the table; Christ dying on the Cross; and Christ present fully in the Body of Christ that is reserved in the Tabernacle. Other layouts are acceptable but should always retain clearly the primacy of Christ and his sacrifice.

Praying for the Dead: Why pray in November? And Why pray at all? November? – Because the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls that begin the month. Pope Gregory III set All Saints Day in around 740 CE with dedication of St Peter's Basilica and the monks of Cluny started praying for the holy souls all month in the 10th Century and the practice spread. Why pray for the dead at all? – Scripture and our deep inner sense of love and reverence and respect: we have biblical roots that lie in 2 Maccabees and the New Testament affirmation of the communion of the faithful/saints as part of the Body of Christ. And it 'feels right' – it is a generous and loving thing to do so, or so it seems to me. The practice of making a donation (of cash) for the offering of Mass has noting to do with the practice of praying. That is a gesture of thanks/generosity to the priest who offers the Mass. The church encourages that the amount be modest to avoid any sense of 'buying' the Mass or giving opportunity for the priest to become avaricious (as has happened in some times and places).

Repair of Leaks: Leaks? Yes, well!! Hmmm! The repairs needed more complex work than anticipated and we want a proper repair not half-baked. So the works will now largely happen during on Monday 3rd, Wednesday 5th, Thursday 6th November.


