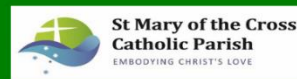

FATHER ANDREW has been on his long-awaited Sabbatical these past few months and is now enjoying a short holiday before returning to the parish on the weekend of October 28. During his Sabbatical he has travelled far and wide beginning with a retreat entitled *"Visiting the Well"* at St Joseph's Baulkham Hills. Next a few days in Dubai on the way to the 13-day Portuguese ***Camino Da Costa***. Accompanying Andrew on the Camino was good friend James, who is the father of Hamish. Many will remember Hamish who was our in-house film maker during the Covid mass recordings. They enjoyed the company of Camino pilgrims from all over the world and some magnificent sights in Portugal and Spain (although perhaps the inside of a Portuguese hospital was not the finest!)

Arriving in Lisbon, Fr Andrew caught the electric atmosphere of the tail-end of World Youth Day. James returned home to his family in Beaumaris and Fr Andrew's good friend Fr Paddy Sykes (PP of the Parish of Junee) arrived to join him as they travelled to Spanish towns, to the top of Africa and back to Portugal, before commencing their 4-week course in Rome on the ***'Scriptural Theology of Mary'*** at the Pontifical North American College. Some very special visits to Assisi, Basilica's, and a private audience with Ms. Chiara Porro, the Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, followed by the General Audience with Pope Francis' will have made some incredible memories. Led by our wonderful, knowledgeable guides, Sr Patricia Williams and volunteer Aarti Munohur, the walking tour took in nine places of interest that tell the story of the indelible mark that Mary and the Sisters of St

Joseph had on Melbourne in the gold rush era, establishing schools for the poor and places of refuge for women and children. The Heritage Centre's Museum and gallery are a treasure trove that tell the story of Saint Mary MacKillop and the Josephite Sisters exemplary life and work. Let The Light Shine

A new documentary commemorating war service and sacrifice in glass

On Thursday September the 14th I joined Bronwyn Hughes - art historian, stained-glass expert; Fiona Gruber – writer and radio producer and David Smith – writer, director, and cameraman at St Brigid's for the filming of a documentary.

The proposed 24-minute documentary, *Let the Light Shine...* 'will shed new light on war and the sacrifice of Australian service personnel, and recognise their contribution by exploring the social, cultural, and military history embedded in glass.'

The magnificent St Brigid's west wall stained-glass window honours the lost comrades in the 58/59th Battalion AIF in New Guinea and Bougainville and will feature as one of five carefully selected examples from the Boer War, First and Second World Wars, Vietnam, and Afghanistan. Bronwyn commented, "They (the windows) represent Australians experience of conflict and loss, raise awareness around differing themes of war, and encourage enquiry around the various forms of reconciliation."

Our founding Father Jim English was the much-admired Chaplain to the 58/59th Battalion. In appreciation, the Battalion Association contributed to the cost of the window when established in 1955.

"Designed to appeal to a wide audience, from community and returned service organisations, art and military museums, to secondary schools and tertiary institutions, the documentary has particular importance as an educational resource within the Australian school history curriculum. It will provide an accessible medium through which to understand service and sacrifice and to question themes around the topic of war and religion, patriotism, race, and gender." said Bronwyn.

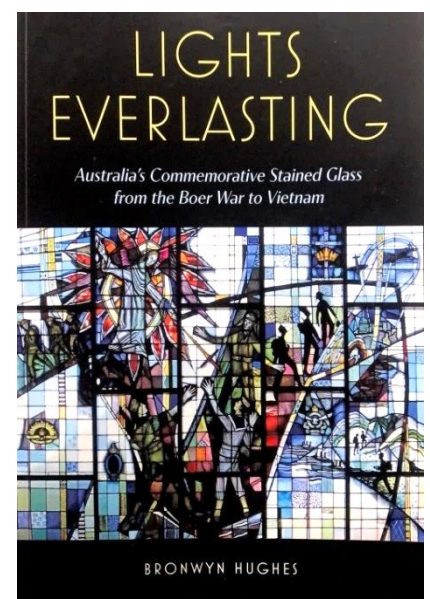

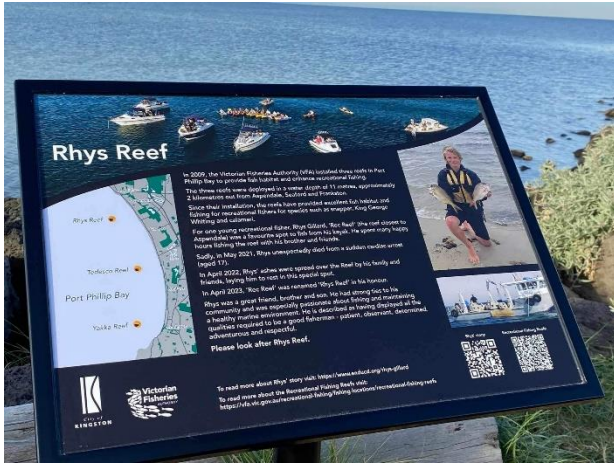
The documentary is planned to be launched on Remembrance Day, 2024, and we will ensure all can see it.

Reef named to remember Rhys Gillard

Rhys Gillard was only 17 when he passed away suddenly on May 13, 2021, being found unresponsive in his bed. Rhys was five weeks from his 18th birthday. He was the eldest son of three boys of Anna and David Gillard of Aspendale.

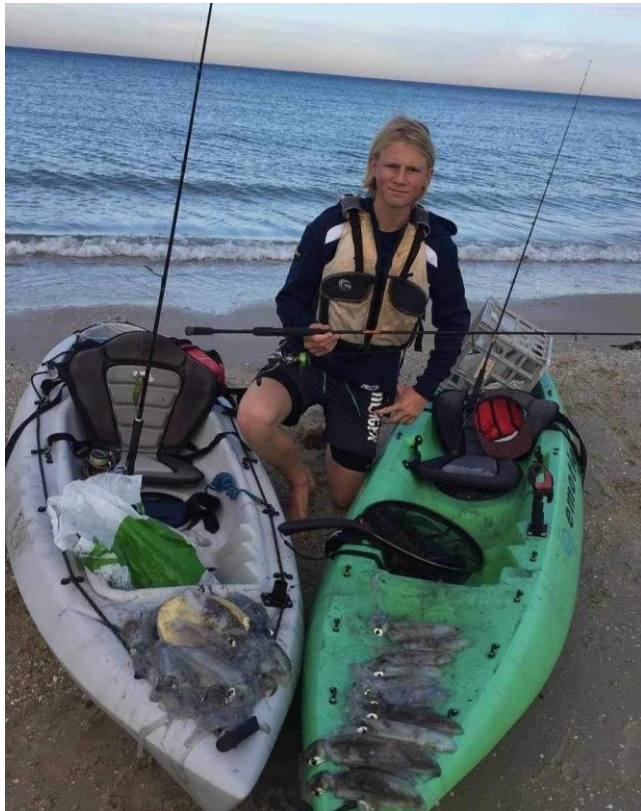
Rhys was school captain of St Louis in final year of Primary School. He was in year 12 at St Bedes and his two younger brothers are still students there. Rhys died of a sudden cardiac arrest and his cause of death is unascertained, meaning no cause was found for his sudden cardiac arrest.

Rhys was so driven, full of energy and enthusiasm. He loved challenges, was a natural leader and confident speaker. He was an excellent student too. He loved all sports, cricket, basketball and excelled at AFL, making the Dandenong Southern Stingrays squad. He was also a very keen fisherman, having taught himself how to fish from books and You Tube, and then he taught his brother. He loved going out fishing on his kayak with his brother and friends.

On Port Phillip Bay there have been three reefs installed to provide fish habitat and to enhance recreational fishing. Rec Reef is closest to Aspendale, the other two are near Seaford and Frankston, and this is where Rhys loved to fish from his kayak.

In April 2022 Rhys ' ashes were spread over the reef by his family and friends laying him to rest in his special spot.

In April 2023 Rec Reef was renamed Rhys Reef in his honour. A beautiful photo memorial plaque has been set in place to remember this beautiful young man.



It is well worth a walk along our magnificent beach to the northern end, past the Mordialloc Sailing Club, and you can see this amazing site to honour Rhys. (Maybe a bench seat is being erected there at this time!)

The Voice to Parliament Information Night on 27th July

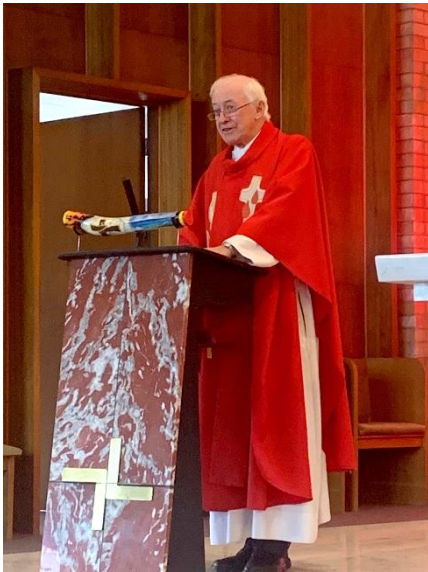

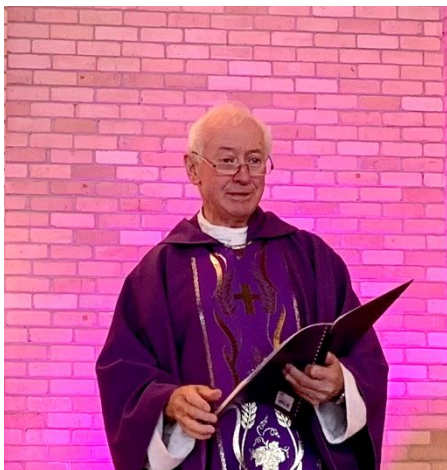

Our aim is for long term enhancement of the Church building with a garden that directs the eye to God. We work to provide a place of welcome, beauty, reflection and ordered tranquillity for everyone. We believe a well-maintained garden shows care and respect for all who enter it.

Farewell dear Don



DON, HIS DAUGHTER CATH & FR PETER ON THE OCCASION OF DON'S 100TH BIRTHDAY IN AUGUST 2023.

Many St Louis' parishioners will fondly recall Don and his daughters Cath and Rose bringing their Dad to 9.30am Sunday mass.

My Dad, Lawrence 'Don' Swaine was born in Cremorne, NSW in 1923. Dad enlisted in the Australian Army and first served as part of the Militia (CMF) forces before being transferred to the 2nd Australian Imperial Force (AIF) during 1942. Dad became a trooper posted to the 2/5 Australian Commando Squadron, and saw service in Borneo, Timor, and New Guinea, along with specialised training at Canungra in Qld.

Dad recalled lots of interesting times while serving: "One unit's job in New Guinea was to get behind enemy lines and send back information about the Japanese. They would get under the water if the enemy was near and use hollow reeds to breathe under water while holding."

Dad enjoyed the order and routine in the Army.

After discharging from the AIF in July 1956, Dad worked in a jam factory, ran a milk bar, and then became a nurse working at St Vincent's hospital. He was one of the first male nurses.

In 1967, Dad married our Mum Marcelle, and they went on to have three children. Sadly, Mum Marcelle passed away in 2002. All three children went on to have their own families.

As a father dad was never judgmental. He was a very spiritual person and a gentleman who never displayed anger or impatience. He always maintained a positive attitude. He always supported your dreams and gave you optimism that you could achieve them. When I told him I wanted to join the police force he built me a hurdle in the backyard so that I could practice. He continued to encourage my dreams right up to the end. Dad also inspired us all with his travel adventures with many of the kids and grandkids having overseas holidays with grandpa.

As a family growing up, we were always having adventures whether that was bushwalking anywhere in Victoria, camping at Wilson's Prom or surfing down at Venus Bay. Looking back, we were always active and dad was very fit, despite smoking a pipe for a fair part of his life. Dad loved nature and the outdoors. He loved to go for a surf and for a hike and was hiking into his eighties, including in the Himalayas.

Dad lived a very full life. Dad credited his longevity to his faith, eating plenty of vegetables, a simple life and remaining calm. We will miss him, his friendship, his stories, the news updates, his listening and supportive ear, and his dry sense of humour. Go well my friend and beautiful dad we love you dearly. Dad's last word were thank you. We thank you dad for sharing some of your life journey with us all and pray you are at peace.
