Gospel

Matthew 20:1-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the marketplace and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So, they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said, "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus, the last will be first, and the first, last.'

Equality or Equity?

How would you feel if you had done a full day's work and were paid the same as someone who had only worked for one hour? Is the landowner in the parable being unjust? He pays the workers exactly what he promised them – but he promised everyone the same amount, regardless of when they started work. The workers who started at 6.00 am complain. How do you think the workers who started later in the day felt? The landowner claims the right to be generous – is generosity unfair? There is a difference between treating people equally and equitably. What has the landowner done here?

Gospel reflection

On a first reading of this gospel story, the reader is probably struck by the unfairness of the situation. The landowner has employed day labourers at different times throughout the day to work in his vineyard. However, come the end of the day, the landowner pays all the day labourers the same amount. Not surprisingly, the labourers employed at daybreak to work the whole day are upset that those who have only worked the last hour of the day are paid the same amount. The landowner reminds them that he is paying them what they agreed at the start of the day, and yet the reader is left uncomfortable about the whole arrangement. Of course, this is the purpose of Jesus' story! The key to the story is in the

introduction. Most of the kingdom parables told by Jesus begin with a formulaic statement, 'The kingdom is like ...' and this one is no different. What follows is almost always a description of an everyday event that is turned on its head. In all of the kingdom parables recorded in the gospels, Jesus describes a world order in which people respond in unexpected and sometimes confusing ways. His message is that the kingdom, or reign, of God turns expectations upside down. In the kingdom, people who are treated badly in this world are held in great esteem; the balance of power is turned upside down; and the usual order of things is challenged. The landowner's final comment in the parable, 'the last will be first, and the first, last', is a perfect example of the challenging nature of Jesus' kingdom parables. In the kingdom, those who hold themselves to be first in this world will be brought down, and those who are treated as least in this world will be exalted.

Historical Context – Labourers for hire

Jesus' parable describes a situation that would have been very familiar to his audience. At the time, there were many quite wealthy landowners who controlled large vineyards, orchards and crop fields. They would have employed a certain number of permanent workers but come harvest time there was a need for more workers and, much like today, they sought to employ part time workers for a short period of time until the rush was over. Men looking for work would gather in the marketplace of a village and landowners would select workers and send them to their property to work.

Scriptural context – Kingdom parables

A feature of the kingdom parables that Jesus used is a challenging 'shift' to the unexpected. Jesus only ever uses parables to describe what the kingdom is like, and never says exactly what it is or isn't. In each parable he compares the kingdom of God to something that would be familiar to a 1st century audience but then he twists the familiar and makes the challenging shift by making the familiar, unfamiliar. (This 'shift' is sometimes called a 'discombobulating shift'.) Jesus tells us that the kingdom of God disrupts our normal way of thinking, it turns our expectations upside down and it completely challenges our 'normal' relationships.



The Pope Leo XIV celebrates his 71st birthday

Pope Leo XIV celebrates his 71st birthday on September 14, 2026, following a year marked by appeals for peace, Apostolic Journeys, and concern for human dignity.

Vatican News

As Pope Leo XIV celebrates his 71st birthday on Monday, September 14, messages and expressions of good wishes have been arriving at the Vatican from around the world. The presidency of the Italian Bishops' Conference, or CEI, sent a message conveying the greetings of Italy's local Churches and thanking the Pope for his service. The Italian Bishops recalled Pope Leo's emphasis on the Gospel as the fundamental priority of ecclesial life and on faith as a personal encounter with Christ. They also highlighted his call for missionary communities, welcoming parishes and effective structures of participation. Referring to the Pope's Angelus address on Sunday, the Italian Bishops' Conference underlined the connection between forgiveness and peace, noting that conflicts arise when reconciliation is absent.



A year marked by peace

Peace has been one of the most frequently recurring themes of Pope Leo's words over the past year. Since speaking after his election of an "unarmed and disarming" peace, he has repeatedly returned to peace and reconciliation during his Apostolic Journeys, encounters, and public addresses.

During the first year of his pontificate, the Pope referred to these two themes more than 400 times, while also frequently speaking about unity, dialogue, hope, and human dignity. His first Apostolic Journey took him to Türkiye and Lebanon. At Nicaea, marking the 1,700th anniversary of the first Ecumenical Council, he stressed Christian unity, while in Lebanon he focused on dialogue and peace.

Pope Leo later became the first pontiff to visit Monaco and Algeria. In Annaba, ancient Hippo, he visited places associated with Saint Augustine. During his journey to Spain, he became the first Pope to address the Spanish Parliament.

On January 6, he closed the Jubilee Year 2025, begun by Pope Francis, by shutting the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica.

His first encyclical, Magnifica humanitas, addressed artificial intelligence and insisted that technology must remain at the service of human dignity, freedom, responsibility, and the common good. He also completed Dilexi te, the Apostolic Exhortation begun by Pope Francis on love for the poor, revisiting the theme during his July visit to Lampedusa and meeting with migrants.

Born in Chicago on September 14, 1955, Pope Leo XIV enters his 72nd year with the central themes of his pontificate clearly defined: peace, unity, and the defence of human dignity.

RCIA

What is the RCIA?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the normal way in which adults become full active, participating members of the Catholic Church.

The goal of the process is full communion which means “full active participation” in the Eucharist and in the whole life of the Catholic faith community.

RCIA helps adults to grow in their relationship with God, become familiar with Catholic teachings and practices, get acquainted with people in the community and get involved in service within the community.

Many persons who want to join the Catholic Church have already been baptised in another Christian Church. They must attend the sessions but do not need to be baptised again.

Safeguarding Our Vulnerable Adults

Safeguarding at St Macartan's is about caring for everyone in our parish community.

At different times in our lives, any of us may need a little extra care or support. This can include older parishioners, people living with disability or illness, those experiencing loneliness or isolation, or anyone who may find it difficult to speak up when something isn't right.

Often, safeguarding begins with simple acts of care — a phone call, a lift to Mass, checking in on someone we haven't seen for a while, or simply taking the time to listen.

If you are concerned about the safety or wellbeing of a vulnerable adult, including possible neglect, abuse or exploitation, please speak up. You don't need to have all the answers or be certain that something is wrong. Sharing a concern can be an important first step in making sure someone receives the support they need.
