Safeguarding Sunday also provides an opportunity to acknowledge the work of clergy, staff and volunteers who work to foster cultures of safety and trust throughout church communities. Their dedication strengthens the Church's commitment to preventing harm, responding appropriately to concerns and promoting the dignity of every person.

- Reviews, audits and assessments of Catholic organisations
- Management of the Australian Catholic Ministry Register

Readings Reflection

[The Debt We Owe](#)

Mercy and forgiveness should be at the heart of the Christian life.

Yet, as today's First Reading wisely reminds us, often we cherish our wrath, nourish our anger, refuse mercy to those who have done us wrong. Jesus, too, strikes close to home in today's Gospel with His realistic portrayal of the wicked servant who won't forgive a fellow servant's debt, even though his own slate has just been wiped clean by their master.

It can't be this way in the kingdom, the Church. In the Old Testament, seven is frequently a number associated with mercy and the forgiveness of sins. The just man sins seven times daily; there is a sevenfold sprinkling of blood for atonement of sins (see Proverbs 24:6; Leviticus 16). But Jesus tells Peter today that we must forgive not seven times, but seventy times seven times. That means: every time.

We are to be merciful as our Father in heaven is merciful (see Luke 6:36; Matthew 5:48). But why? Why does Jesus repeatedly warn that we can't expect forgiveness for our trespasses unless we're willing to forgive others their trespasses against us?

Because, as Paul reminds us in today's Epistle, we are the Lord's. Each of us has been purchased by the blood of Christ shed for us on the Cross (see Revelation 5:9). As we sing in today's Psalm, though we deserved to die for our sins, He doesn't deal with us according to our crimes. The mercy and forgiveness we show to others should be the heartfelt expression of our gratitude for the mercy and forgiveness shown to us.

This is why we should remember our last days, set our enmities aside, and stop judging others. We know that one day we will stand before the judgment seat and give account for what we've done with the new life given to us by Christ (see Romans 14:10, 12).

So we forgive each other from the heart, overlook each other's faults, and await the crown of His kindness and compassion.

FESTA ANNUNZIATA—FROM OPPIDO MAMERTINA TO MT EVELYN

Throughout Italy, towns and villages have their own patron saint, honoured each year with a special festa — often bringing together faith, tradition, food and the whole community.

In Oppido Mamertina, a small town in Calabria in Southern Italy, that special devotion is to Maria Santissima Annunziata — the Madonna Annunziata, Patroness of the town.

For generations, the people of Oppido have come together to honour the Madonna with Mass, a procession through the streets and, of course, food, family and celebration.

It's a tradition that has been passed down through generations — and eventually travelled all the way from Calabria to Mt Evelyn!

So how did a Festa from a small town in Calabria end up being celebrated here at St Mary's?

Like so many Italian traditions in Australia, the story begins with migration. In the years following the Second World War, many families from Oppido Mamertina (and surrounding towns) left Calabria in search of new opportunities and a new life in Australia.

Some eventually made their homes in Melbourne's outer east, including Mt Evelyn and the surrounding areas.

They may have left Oppido and other parts behind, but they brought with them something incredibly important — their faith, their traditions and their devotion to Maria Santissima Annunziata.

Whilst Australia was filled with many opportunities, there was always a feeling of nostalgia for these religious celebrations. Something was missing...and so, thousands of kilometres from Calabria, the Festa della Madonna Annunziata became part of the story of our community here at St Mary's, Mt Evelyn.

For many families, the Festa became more than a religious celebration. It was a way to stay connected, to bring families together and to pass a little piece of home on to the next generation.

And generations later, we are still carrying that tradition forward.
